PASTOR'S WORDS Dear friends in Christ, as we gather together in worship, prayer, and service, we are reminded of the call upon our lives as disciples of Christ—to love one another as He has loved us. In these days, the church faces many questions, including one that has become particularly significant in some of our congregations: should we,

as a community of faith, discern whether or not to adopt specific policies regarding LGBTQIA+ individuals?

It is important to remember that we, as a United Methodist Church, are a part of a broader Christian family that spans time and place. Our shared mission is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, and this mission requires both faithfulness to Scripture and responsiveness to the needs of all God's children.

In considering this question, I invite us to reflect deeply on a few key principles that guide us as United Methodists:

- The Call to Love: Jesus commands us to love one another, not just in word but in action. This includes reaching out to those who may feel marginalized, rejected, or excluded. Our love should be unconditional, mirroring God's boundless love for each person, regardless of their identity or background.
- **Scripture and Tradition**: As United Methodists, we recognize the authority of Scripture, the importance of tradition, reason, and experience in shaping our understanding of God's will. We understand that this is a complex issue, and we seek to engage in open, respectful dialogue about how we interpret the teachings of Scripture in light of our call to love and care for all people.
- **Unity in Diversity**: The body of Christ is made up of many different members, each with unique gifts and experiences. We are called to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. In moments of disagreement, we must work hard to ensure that our conversations are marked by grace and respect. It is through our unity in Christ that we can best bear witness to God's love in the world.
- Guidance from the Holy Spirit: As we deliberate and pray over these important matters,
  let us lean into the guidance of the Holy Spirit, asking for wisdom, understanding, and discernment. God has called us to be a people who seek justice, love, mercy, and walk humbly with God.

We are a community of people with differing opinions, backgrounds, and experiences, yet we

PASTOR'S WORDS are united by our faith in Jesus Christ. I encourage us to approach this question with humility and openness, recognizing that no decision we make is ever without the need for ongoing prayer, discernment, and reflection.

As your pastor, I invite you to engage in this conversation with respect and empathy. Let us listen to one another, especially those who might feel the pain of exclusion. Let us pray together, seeking God's will and trusting in the Holy Spirit to lead us in love. While the question of specific policies regarding LGBTQIA+ is important, we must also remember that it is but one part of our larger call to be faithful disciples of Christ in a broken and hurting world. Let us not allow our disagreements to divide us, but instead, let them deepen our commitment to live out the love and grace of God in all that we do. In closing, I encourage you to pray for wisdom as we continue this journey together. May God's peace, which surpasses all understanding, guide our hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. We are scheduling a dialogue meeting for everyone to share their perspectives on this for February 10th at 4:30 PM.

#### A Note from the Administrative Council:

A special meeting of the Administrative Council was held on January 23, 2025. The purpose of the meeting was to approve the church members selected to serve on the two teams needed to proceed with the Simplified Accountable Structure (SAS) program. Guidelines indicate that the lay leader, lay representative to Annual Conference, Staff-Parish Relations Committee chair, and Trustee chair must be designated to serve on the Leadership Board. Nine members are recommended, although for smaller churches six members may be appointed. In addition, one person may serve in more than one of these positions. The Pastor can serve on the Leadership Board, but does not have a vote. Terms are for three years, after which new members are selected. Serving on the Discernment Team are Janet Helmbold, Connie Kelsey, Pastor B.J., Penny Tracy, Char Crosby, and James Gaffney. The Discernment Team has the responsibility for becoming familiar with the SAS structure and process, and determining how the current church administration, would change if the process is adopted. Serving on the Prayer Team are Gordie Barry, Louise Burson, Candace Haskell, Carolyn Williams, Carol Livingston, and Mary Whinnen. The Prayer Team is charged with praying for the Discernment Team, the church body, and seeking the will of God throughout the process.

While there are expenses associated with the overall process, there are also both Conference and District grants available to assist with covering the costs. This church already has purchased the necessary books for the team members. We have also applied for, and been approved for, a District grant which will help defray the cost of meeting with a coach, the Rev. James Nogle. In addition, Rev. Nogle, who lives in Lake City, will charge mileage only from St. Ignace to Manistique rather than from Lake City, as he can combine his trips with St. Ignace and Manistique in one, allowing both churches to share the costs.

So far we are at the very beginning stage of this process. We will keep you informed of our progress as we go along. All church members are invited to attend the SAS meetings, although only Team members have voice and vote.




Any of the congregation interested in pulling out their instruments and having a jam session for special music please contact Janet Helmbold.
